A Look at the Lectionary...

The Scripture readings for this week, to my mind at least, are about God's ability to bring life and hope out of situations where we believe that's impossible.

- In Genesis, the second born son supplants the first.
- In Psalm 119, the writer is stumbling in the dark, suffering, doubting, and yet, in the end, finds joy in his or her faith.
- Paul writes to the Romans about the saving hope that Christians have in Jesus Christ, whose spirit can restore to life even those once thought dead in their sins.
- Finally, in Matthew, Jesus shares his wonderful story of the sower, the seed, and the ground, pointing out that, even in the midst of considerable failure, there is yet hope for a good harvest wherever God's word is planted.

Genesis 25 tells the story of Isaac and Rebekah and their sons Jacob and Esau. In this week's reading, Jacob plays on Esau's hunger and impulsiveness to have Esau give up his rights as the firstborn and cede them to Jacob, the second born – all because the pot of lentil stew and fresh-baked bread that Jacob made smelled so good, and Esau was so hungry.

The story leaves us wondering how often we squander the gifts that God gives us for a shortsighted and short-lived pleasure that all too soon fades, leaving us hungry and empty yet again.

Romans 8 begins with one of the greatest affirmations of faith in the New Testament, Paul's promise that, for those who are in Jesus Christ, there is "now no condemnation." Paul sees human life as a struggle between those who live according to the flesh and those who live their lives with spiritual priorities. The one way leads to death. The other leads, not just to life, but to eternal life. Even more powerfully and more importantly, the new life that the risen Christ offers is a gift in the here and now.

In Matthew 13, Jesus pictures a farmer scattering seed across his fields. Some seed accidentally lands on the road, where birds eat it. Others land in rocky soil where they quickly sprout but just as quickly die. Thorns and weeds choke out still more seed. Thankfully, some seed ends up in good soil and produces a crop for harvest. Jesus explains that the seed thrown on the path is those who hear the word but, before it has a chance to take root, have the seed snatched away by evil. The seed in rocky soil are those who hear the word with joy but fall away when they face tough times. The seed sown among weeds stands for those who hear the word but then have it choked out by worldly cares and loves. Finally, the seed that lands on good soil is those who hear the word, understand it, and live it out in their lives.

That leaves the verses from Psalm 119. Verse 105 stands out for me this week. "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." There would be no need for a light were there no darkness. Darkness is part of creation, present, so Genesis says, even before God called light into being. The question is how we find our way through it.

The psalmist speaks of being severely afflicted, and of the wicked laying a snare. For this person at that time, darkness wasn't balanced by light, but instead seemed to be overpowering it.

By the end of the psalm, though, the writer finds hope in God's word promises to "perform God's statutes forever, to the end."

As we cope with a raging pandemic we can, like the psalmist, feel afflicted and spend our days trying to avoid the snares we're sure are all around us.

While we do live in the midst of unprecedented danger, we are still people of faith. We build our hope on God's word as well as om the promise of Christ's resurrection and his presence with us now, in ways we too often both fail to see and appreciate.

Genesis 25:19-34

These are the descendants of Isaac, Abraham's son: Abraham was the father of Isaac, and Isaac was forty years old when he married Rebekah, daughter of Bethuel the Aramean of Paddan-aram, sister of Laban the Aramean.

Isaac prayed to the LORD for his wife, because she was barren; and the LORD granted his prayer, and his wife Rebekah conceived. The children struggled together within her; and she said, "If it is to be this way, why do I live?" So she went to inquire of the LORD.

And the LORD said to her, "Two nations are in your womb, and two peoples born of you shall be divided; the one shall be stronger than the other, the elder shall serve the younger."

When her time to give birth was at hand, there were twins in her womb. The first came out red, all his body like a hairy mantle; so they named him Esau. Afterward his brother came out, with his hand gripping Esau's heel; so he was named Jacob.

Isaac was sixty years old when she bore them. When the boys grew up, Esau was a skillful hunter, a man of the field, while Jacob was a quiet man, living in tents. Isaac loved Esau, because he was fond of game; but Rebekah loved Jacob.

Once when Jacob was cooking a stew, Esau came in from the field, and he was famished. Esau said to Jacob, "Let me eat some of that red stuff, for I am famished!" (Therefore he was called Edom.)

Jacob said, "First sell me your birthright."

Esau said, "I am about to die; of what use is a birthright to me?"

Jacob said, "Swear to me first."

So he swore to him, and sold his birthright to Jacob. Then Jacob gave Esau bread and lentil stew, and he ate and drank, and rose and went his way. Thus, Esau despised his birthright.

<u>Psalm 119:105-112</u>

Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.

I have sworn an oath and confirmed it, to observe your righteous ordinances.

- I am severely afflicted; give me life,
- O LORD, according to your word.
- Accept my offerings of praise,
- O LORD, and teach me your ordinances.

I hold my life in my hand continually, but I do not forget your law.

The wicked have laid a snare for me, but I do not stray from your precepts.

Your decrees are my heritage forever; they are the joy of my heart.

I incline my heart to perform your statutes forever, to the end.

<u>Romans 8:1-11</u>

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit.

For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason, the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law--indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God.

But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach.

And he told them many things in parables, saying "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. "Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away.

"Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!"

"Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path.

"As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away.

"As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing.

"But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

What to Expect When Returning to In-Person Worship

Before You Go to Church

- ✓ Remember to register with the church office (475-2947). In order to keep our attendance at or below the 50-person limit, only those who signed up in advance will be admitted. *Reservations for worship on July 19 will start being taken Monday, July 13.*
- ✓ If you call to sign up and the headcount for that Sunday is full, your name will be placed on a waiting list for the following week, which will be filled on a first-come, first-reserved basis. If we consistently run out of room and there is enough interest, an additional service may be scheduled in the future.
- ✓ PLEASE DON'T COME TO CHURCH IF YOU'RE ILL OR NOT FEELING WELL

When You Get to Church

- ✓ Doors will be open about 20 minutes before worship begins at 8 AM
- ✓ <u>Please be patient</u> as our greeters take your temperature, check to make sure you're among those who registered, and help you sanitize your hands.
- ✓ <u>THE WEARING OF MASKS IS STRONGLY ENCOURAGED AT ALL TIMES.</u> Please remember that, by wearing a mask, you're protecting your neighbor from unintentional infection. If you don't have a mask, one will be provided for you when you arrive.
- ✓ Observe social distancing at all times.
- ✓ Ushers will take you to your seat and dismiss you at the end of worship, filling pews from the front before the service, and dismissing people from the rear at the end to minimize contact.

During Worship

- ✓ Please don't change seats.
- ✓ Please don't leave unless absolutely necessary.

- ✓ Be prepared for a "new normal," at least for the foreseeable future. That will mean, in part:
 - A shorter than normal worship service
 - No hymnals or bulletins
 - No singing or spoken responses
 - No passing of the peace beyond a friendly wave
 - No lingering in the foyer before or after worship
 - No passing of the collection plate. Please leave your offering in the box provided at the rear of the sanctuary.
- ✓ When we celebrate communion, we will do so with sealed cups distributed by an usher as you enter the sanctuary.

After the Service

- ✓ Be sure to take all personal items with you.
- ✓ Wait for an usher to dismiss you.
- ✓ Don't linger in the foyer or outside the church doors.
- ✓ Please leave your mask on until you're outside and away from others.

Worship under COVID will require extra volunteers,

a minimum of two to usher and two to help with screening. You can volunteer to help when you call in your reservation. Thanks!

While the Church Council, staff, and volunteers at St. John's will do their best to follow public health guidelines, anyone attending worship should understand that they assume the danger of contracting COVID-19 anytime they enter a public space. No matter how many precautions we may take, we cannot eliminate the risk of infection.

Worship in our sanctuary resumes on July 19 with an 8 AM service.






